EIGHT AGENCIES WORK AS ONE TO BENEFIT ALL

In early January, staff members from the Villages of Flossmoor and Homewood, from the Libraries of Flossmoor and Homewood, from Homewood-Flossmoor Park District, from Homewood School District 153, Flossmoor School District 161 and Homewood-Flossmoor Community High School all came together at Village Hall for a tornado simulation exercise. The exercise was designed to help the governmental organizations walk through the safety and communications needs of a disaster of this type. Assistant Fire Chief Matt Berk and Assistant Village Manager Jonathan Bogue — who designed the exercise — served as meeting facilitators.

“The tornado simulation training was well on our radar before the actual 2024 EF-1 tornado that hit both of our communities,” says Bogue. “We were fortunate that the magnitude of this tornado was relatively minimal, but it definitely helped to get this training scheduled and actualized, as our communities realize that severe weather has been on the rise.”

At the training, agencies considered ways to share resources and facilities. They also identified vulnerabilities to textbook response plans should emergency circumstances

impact modes of communication, temporary shelter and reunification centers.

The previous January (2024) the same intergovernmental group met at Homewood-Flossmoor Community High School led by H-F Director of Communications and Community Engagement Carla Erdey to participate in a crisis-communications training drill with Andrea Darlas, a media consultant and Senior Director of Public Affairs at the University of Illinois – Urbana-Champaign. Participants learned best practices for handling media requests during crisis events, then those practices were put into action through mock press conferences.

These exercises are just examples of many instances of intergovernmental cooperation that has been a tradition in the Villages of Flossmoor and Homewood for more than 20 years, says Village Manager Bridget Wachtel. Representatives from these eight agencies meet for a working lunch at least nine times per year for information sharing, support and planning purposes.

“The H-F Intergovernmental Group is special; it is not typically found in other communities,” says Wachtel. “It

makes the challenging times just a little bit easier when you know you can find support in your neighboring government agencies and administrators.”

Throughout the years, the group has tackled specific issues and worked towards common goals. In the early 2000s, agencies pooled financial and staff resources to work on marketing the communities together through advertising and outreach initiatives, which included print ads, postcards, brochures and a website. The team even assembled baskets of H-F goods and materials and brought them to large employers' human resources offices to draw attention to the communities for employees who were looking to relocate.

Prior to the recession in the early 2000s, the Homewood and Flossmoor's Community Relations Commissions worked with area banks to provide low-interest mortgages to local employees of the agencies as way to encourage people to formally become H-F residents.

Looking forward as the group evolves, Wachtel says she sees the H-F team focusing more on emergency management and sharing of resources.

“There is an underlying understanding amongst these agencies that our value is in our housing stock, community resources and our schools, and that there are advantages to working together, which helps our communities thrive and grow,” she says.

- Early Voting Available: March 17-31, 2025 (closest locations include Matteson Community Center and the Markham Courthouse; 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Mondays-Saturdays, plus 10 a.m.-4 p.m. on Sundays)
- Election Day: April 1, 2025; polls are open 6 a.m.-7 p.m.

WE MADE IT A DAY ON!

Thank you to all who participated in the 10th annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service on Monday, Jan. 20! Twenty-five service projects were featured across the Village, including many new programs such as Flossmoor Firebird's used sports equipment drive for Leveling the Playing Field, plus a second community blood drive offered that weekend at Flossmoor Community Church. Some records were broken this year: 150 new LEGO sets were collected for Bricks of Hope, which is that organization's single-day donation record. Sets will be brought to children and teens at area hospitals to make their stays a little more pleasant. Streetscape Improvements Planned for Downtown Flossmoor

In fall 2024, the Village Board of Trustees approved a plan for Flossmoor's Central Business District Roadway, Pedestrian & Streetscape Improvements Project. This project consists of improvements to Flossmoor's downtown business area along Sterling Avenue, Central Drive and Park Drive with a primary goal of improving pedestrian and traffic safety and a secondary goal of downtown beautification. It will be a much-needed refresh of the center of the Village. This project has been designed by Baxter & Woodman Consulting Engineers and Teska Associates with input from the Project Steering Committee, made up of 20 individuals, including Village residents, downtown business owners, commissioners and staff. Project benefits include:

- Permanent safety measures
- Slower, safer traffic
- Maximized parking & bike racks
- Increased seating
- More trees and native plants
- Installation of traffic splitter islands

The project is scheduled to be bid on through the Illinois Department of Transportation State Letting on Friday, March 7. It was awarded an Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP) grant in the not-to-exceed amount of \$1,184,456, which is expected to cover 80 percent of the base construction and construction engineering costs. Once the contract is awarded by IDOT, a project timeline will be created and posted on the Village website; it is estimated to last from May through September 2025. According to Public Works Director John Brunke, the downtown area and all downtown businesses will remain accessible to residents, business owners and visitors throughout the project.

New Courts Headed to Highlands Park

The Homewood-Flossmoor Park District has started work on new racquet sports courts at Highlands Park, located at Lawrence Crescent and Kathleen Lane. There will be two new pickleball courts and one separately fenced tennis court. Work should be completed early this spring once the weather improves, says the park district. These new courts are part of the renovation of area parks, following the removal of tennis courts at Heather Hill Park, just to the north of Highlands Park, due to the construction of a basin as part of the Flossmoor Road Viaduct Improvements Project. The addition of two new pickleball courts in Flossmoor is an exciting addition for current and future fans of the growing sport as it will now double the number of courts found in the Village. There are currently two active pickleball courts in Flossmoor Hills Park. Additional outdoor Flossmoor tennis courts are available in Flossmoor Park and Pheasant Trails Park.

Next Phases of the Flossmoor Viaduct Improvements Project

The next phases of the Flossmoor Road Viaduct Drainage Improvements Project will be starting later this spring. Phase 3 — which includes the storm sewer installation on Lawrence Crescent from Maryland Avenue to the newly constructed Heather Hill Detention Basin — will be bid on in March with construction starting this spring. Phase 4 — which includes the storm sewer installation on Sterling Avenue from Maryland Avenue (north approximately 500 feet) — will also be bid on this spring by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as part of the Section 219 Grant Program. Work on this phase should start in June with expected completion in late summer. The last and final phase of this project is Phase 5, which includes the remaining storm sewer installation on Sterling Avenue to the viaduct. This phase should be bid on this summer with construction starting in fall 2025 and continuing through spring 2026. New Online Renewal Option for 2025 Vehicle Stickers & Animal Tags

In the Village of Flossmoor, annual vehicle stickers and animal tags must be purchased and displayed / worn by Tuesday, April 15.

New this year, residents will have the option to renew their stickers and tags via an online portal available at [Flossmoor.org](https://www.flossmoor.org).

For all vehicles registered to a Flossmoor address — including leased vehicles, company cars and vehicles kept outside of the Village — residents are required to purchase and display a current Flossmoor vehicle sticker in the lower right-hand corner of the front windshield.

Vehicle sticker fees are: \$40/car, RV, or truck A or B; \$65/truck over B; and \$20/motorcycle. Resident seniors age 65+ may receive one sticker per household for \$15.

Renewal forms for vehicle stickers — along with animal tag applications for Flossmoor's dogs and cats (\$15/animal) — were mailed out to residents the end of February. For more information, visit www.flossmoor.org/228/Vehicle-Stickers or call 708-798-2300.

Tree Care Update

The Village has been busy pruning parkway trees in the Old Flossmoor neighborhood this winter, as this is the best time to prune trees. Winter tree pruning helps prevent the transmission of insects and diseases. The 2024 cicada emergence caused damage to small-diameter tree branches. The cicada-damaged branches on small, newly planted trees may need removal. The cicada-damaged branches on large trees can stay on the tree. The branches will naturally break off and will not significantly affect healthy trees.

Winter tree removals in the Village continued throughout winter 2024-25. Many trees removed are sugar, red, silver and Norway maples because maples in the region have been experiencing maple decline due to various stress factors and age. In addition, maple trees were overplanted in many communities years ago. Flossmoor has been and will continue planting different trees to promote tree diversity. A few less-common parkway species planted in 2024 included buckeye, black cherry, yellowwood, sweet bay magnolia and bald cypress. In addition, Flossmoor has focused on planting oak and hickory trees to help maintain the area's native oak-hickory forest ecosystem. Flossmoor's continued planting efforts will reduce the impact of insects, diseases and decline while preserving the benefits of Flossmoor's urban forest. As spring begins, please remember to water newly planted

trees. Small, newly planted trees need a minimum of 15 gallons of water weekly for 2-3 years. If possible, water with a garden hose. Turn the garden hose on low flow and water the tree for 5 to 10 minutes. Mulch trees to a maximum depth of 4 inches. The maximum depth includes the previous mulch around the base of the tree. After mulching the tree, brush away mulch from around the tree trunk. Mulch will help maintain moisture in the root system, and decomposing mulch will add nutrients to the soil. In addition, mulch will help keep mowers and equipment away from the tree. Equipment hitting the tree can damage the water and nutrient-conducting tissues in tree trunks.

Flossmoor will continue its annual Parkway Tree Planting Program in 2025 with a selection of trees that will help promote species diversity. The Fall 2025/Spring 2026 Parkway Tree Planting Program application will be available this summer. This program provides an opportunity to replant parkways from recent tree removals. All residents with space available for a parkway tree can participate. Details will be posted at www.flossmoor.org. To request an application to be mailed to your address, contact Public Works. Spring Construction at 161 Schools

Spring is often the beginning of construction season in homes and roadways, and this year, it also applies to Flossmoor School District 161 schools, as the district continues its long-range capital improvement plans.

Specifically this spring, the district is starting construction on a new office for Heather Hill Elementary School. A new office is needed to provide a secure entry way into this busy building. Work on the office is expected there throughout the spring and summer months. Also, once the 2024-25 school year concludes, crews will begin renovating all classroom learning spaces by refreshing the lighting, furniture and classroom technology, among other projects, at both Heather Hill and Serena Hills Elementary School. Besides cosmetic improvements, the district has been busy updating boilers and air conditioning units, roof systems, and other areas, so that school buildings are in good working order for the foreseeable future. Plans are set to make improvements at the other District 161 schools — Flossmoor Hills Elementary, Western Avenue Elementary and Parker Junior High School — next summer 2026.

The district would like to remind residents of some traffic safety guidelines during construction to keep students, staff and neighbors safe. When traveling around Heather Hill Elementary School, please:

- Avoid blocking driveways or crosswalks;
- Do not double-park or stop in unauthorized areas;
- Refrain from using cell phones while driving;
- Avoid three-point turns in a school zone, and;
- Avoid standing, stopping or parking on the west side of Lawrence Crescent.

Flossmoor's New Police Chief Carl Estelle



Police Chief Estelle

In February, the Flossmoor Board of Trustees approved the appointment of Carl Estelle as the Village's Police Chief. Estelle has been serving Flossmoor as its Director of Police Services since August 2024. In Flossmoor, the position of Police Chief is a mayoral appointment with a confirming vote by the Board of Trustees.

"Mr. Estelle adds years of leadership and policing experience to our Village," says Flossmoor Mayor Michelle Nelson. "I have the utmost faith in his ability to move the Police Department forward, improving efficiencies and technologies, and working with residents so that Flossmoor may continue to be one of the safest and most desirable communities in Chicagoland."

Estelle, a Flossmoor resident since 2013, took the oath of office at Monday's meeting. He has more than 30 years of leadership in law enforcement and management. Before joining the Flossmoor Police Department, he served as the City Administrator of Country Club Hills and the Director of Security Operations and Compliance

for the City Colleges of Chicago Safety and Security Department.

Estelle has decades of progressive experience in law enforcement, community policing and collaborative public-safety practices. His experience includes several years as an investigator and as the supervisor of investigations. Specifically, he served six years as Captain of Police for the city of East Palo Alto, Calif. Prior to that, he had served 11 years as the Special Agent Supervisor for the California Department of Justice, where he was commander of the security detail for the state's Attorney General, as well as the task force commander responsible for directing criminal investigations. His law-enforcement career began as a Police Officer for the city of Oakland, Calif., where he spent more than a decade patrolling neighborhoods and working in the Special Duty Unit and with the Drug Enforcement Agency Task Force.

Since joining Flossmoor in August as its Director of Police Services, Estelle has been focused on completing many department goals, including filling staff vacancies, implementing new technology, and managing department capital projects, in addition to community outreach with neighborhoods and schools, special operational planning for Village events, and the recruitment for and evaluation of the Police Department.

Since being hired, he also completed an out-of-state reciprocity program through the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board. This training consisted of a 118-hour Law for Police online module, a four-hour mandatory firearm class and the law enforcement equivalency exam.

In addition, Estelle's credentials from California were verified. Meeting these conditions of reciprocity allows for Estelle to hold a sworn police position in the State of Illinois.

"Mr. Estelle is a positive addition to our team and after having successfully completed the conditions to receive reciprocity from the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, I was pleased to recommend that the Mayor appoint him Police Chief," says Bridget Wachtel, Village Manager.

Estelle said his current priorities for the Flossmoor Police Department as Chief now include:

- Improving community policing and public trust
- Reducing crime and enhancing public safety
- Improving traffic safety and enforcement
- Modernizing technology
- Improving recruitment and advertising
- Enhancing school safety programs
- Increasing public engagement
- Seeking funding and grants

"I am truly honored to serve as your new Police Chief," he says. "I want to express my sincere gratitude to the Board who entrust me with this responsibility, to the dedicated men and women of the Flossmoor Police Department for their service and commitment, and to the residents for the trust you place in us every day. My focus will be on community engagement, proactive crime prevention and officer well-being, as a strong Police Department is built upon the support of its officers and the community it serves."

Community Relations Commission Renews Purpose & Intent

At the Feb. 3 Board of Trustees meeting, the board approved an updated Purpose and Intent for the Community Relations Commission. Updates were recommended by CRC Chair Phillippa Leon-Thompson and CRC Vice Chair Jackie Riffice, based on their experience and service to the commission over the past several years. The revised document renews the CRC's commitment to celebrating diversity in Flossmoor and defines the role of the CRC Commissioners.
