Spring Green

While trees bloom, volunteers get busy in Flossmoor

As spring draws near, you can begin looking for beautiful flowers on Flossmoor's trees (like the one shown on this newsletter's cover featuring a blooming Red-bud). These flowers attract insects and birds that feed on pollen and nectar. Large, showy and fragrant flowers, such as those on a Sweet Bay Magnolia, attract insects, increasing the chance of pollination.

Trees can also be wind-pollinated. According to Dave Becker, Flossmoor's Forestry Maintenance Technician, wind-pollinated trees tend to have small flowers that put out large amounts of pollen to float and catch the wind. Wind-pollinated trees include Oaks and Walnuts. These pollinated flowers form fruit and seed for birds and wildlife to eat. Wind, birds and wildlife spread seeds. New saplings sprout when a seed lands in a conducive environment for growth.

Each tree attracts different in-

sects and wildlife, which support a diverse ecosystem. This is one of the reasons Flossmoor also diversifies tree species when new trees are planted in parkways and on Village-owned properties.

While community tree plantings now take place in the fall, there are always "green" ways to get involved in Flossmoor. This spring, the Village is proud to be partnering with the Village of Homewood and the Homewood-Flossmoor Park District for a cross-community cleaning. The inaugural **H-F Community Cleanup** is set for Saturday, April 4.

In previous years, each community would host its own cleanup day and the park district would offer Park Pride Day in May. Combining these smaller efforts will make a big impact! Volunteers are needed that morning from 8 a.m.-Noon. The park district is hosting a free breakfast for volunteers at Wiley's Grill to help provide

energy for the day. Following breakfast, volunteers will be divided into smaller groups to tackle projects throughout the community, including in area parks and at schools. The morning will wrap up with a thank-you lunch at the Village of Homewood. Sign up to volunteer at: <https://forms.gle/83306GrwNQVeQRsX8>.

Recyclepalooza has returned to the spring season to aid you in your spring-cleaning efforts at home. Bring your hard-to-recycle items to Parker Junior High School on Saturday, April 25, from 9 a.m.-Noon. This drive-through event grows each year with help from the Green Commission and student-volunteers. View a list of accepted recyclables on the Village website. (There's no need to bring batteries or household paint anymore, as these items can now be easily recycled locally at Home Depot and Sherwin-Williams, respectively.)

Volunteers are also needed to help with the **organic community garden** at Homewood-Flossmoor High School. A joint effort between the school and the Green Commission, the garden is also an experiential project for students. The Green Commission will aid students in planting vegetables and herbs this spring, then they will harvest together in the fall. Volunteers will help weed and prune the garden throughout the growing season.

Get to Know Flossmoor's Dave Becker
A certified arborist, Dave is the Village's Forestry Maintenance Technician. He holds

an associate's degree in Horticulture from Joliet Junior College and has earned a Tree Risk Assessment Qualification.

How did you become interested in trees? From a young age, I enjoyed exploring forests near my house. I noticed the different trees and plants, but had no idea what types they were. This interest led me to the path of wanting to know more. I enrolled in classes to learn woody plant identification and loved it. I have continued to build on my knowledge by attending Arborist trainings.

What is the most rewarding part of your job? Planting trees and watching them grow, and knowing that they will provide benefits for generations to come.

What is your favorite type of tree? I have many, but one of my favorites is the Persimmon. I first saw one camping in southern Illinois many years ago, and I decided to climb it to see what kind of fruit it had. I dropped down a handful of Persimmons to friends so we could eat them for breakfast. I tried the first one and my mouth just puckered up. I decided to try another, and it tasted fantastic with a slight mango flavor. That Persimmon was ripe. The largest Persimmon tree in Flossmoor is located on the right-of-way in front of a home on Bunker Avenue.

Action! Production Studio Planned

A multimedia entertainment company has been given the green light to begin development of a professional production studio on Village-owned property on 198th Street. Only Believe Entertainment (OBE), LLC, led by owner Barry Brewer, is planning to relocate to Flossmoor from Merrville, Ind., thanks in part to the Illinois Tax Credit Bill, which makes Illinois one of the most financially attractive states in the country to produce films. The planned studio will draw production crews from around the country, provide jobs for local film professionals, increase sales at local businesses and restaurants, and help promote Flossmoor as a destination.

Brewer is an actor/comedian/musician who competed on *America's Got Talent* and has worked with producer Tyler Perry, among other accomplishments. During his presentation at the Jan. 20 Board of Trustees meeting, Brewer shared that this development would include three buildings, along with internal roadways. Next steps for the project: Reviewing construction plans with the Plan Committee and acquiring permits through the Village.

Slow Down & Buckle Up, Flossmoor

The Flossmoor Police Department has been able to step up its traffic enforcement, thanks to a Sustained Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). The grant has been funded up to \$120,000 from May 2025-September 2026.

“We are grateful for this grant, which has and will continue to allow us to increase enforcement of impaired driving, seat belt, speeding and other traffic safety laws under the banners of ‘Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over,’ ‘Click It or Ticket’ and ‘Drive High, Get a DUI,’” says Police Chief Carl Estelle. “Our top priority is the safety of everyone on our roadways, and we will continue holding those who break the laws accountable.”

This is the second consecutive year that Flossmoor has received the STEP grant. Residents should expect to see additional enforcement operations, particularly during high-risk periods, such as holidays and weekends. So far, the grant has resulted in more than 800 traffic citations issued in Flossmoor.

he is also a U.S. Army veteran, who served two tours in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, as a detention specialist. In Olympia Fields, he served in leadership and instructional roles, including Acting Officer in Charge, Field Training Officer and Union President.

The two additional Police Officers are new recruits and recent graduates of the Suburban Law Enforcement Academy. Officer Anthony Caldanaro is a graduate of Homewood-Flossmoor High School and the University of Mississippi, as well as a former collegiate baseball player. Officer Caldanaro aims to bring integrity, dedication and a community-focused approach to the Department.

Officer Benjamin Barker worked previously as a full-time EMT and as a USAF Staff Sergeant with a passion for community involvement and emergency response. He has retained his national certification through NEMRT and plans to use his skills to serve Flossmoor in every way.

The Officers will be led by a new Police Sergeant: David Levy, who has served the Village for his entire 18-year career, was named the Village’s newest Police Sergeant in November, replacing retired Sergeant Brian Tencza. Sgt. Levy has served Flossmoor as both Acting Shift Leader and Shift Leader, and he is a member of the Field Training Unit, which is responsible for developing and guiding new officers to meet the high standards of the Department. Deeply committed to community engagement, he is very visible at Flossmoor events and businesses. He was honored by his peers as the 2024 Officer of the Year.

Flossmoor and the Community Relations Commission celebrated the 11th Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service in January by offering a wide range of service projects that connected community members together in the spirit of giving. New projects this year included:

- A partnership with the Home-wood-Flossmoor Park District, which presented a special program, *From Service to Sol-idarity*. The presentation led by Tracy Crawford, a Senior Learning Strategist, focused on educating participants on cross-cultural communication, implicit bias, intent vs. impact and advocacy.
- A special screening of film-maker Tom Dobrez of Flossmoor's Future's Floss-moor-based film, *A More Perfect Place*. The screening was paired with a food drive in partnership with Ann Jackson of the Center for Food Equity in Medicine, helping to support the Center's ongoing work to address food access and equity.
- A community art project hosted at Village Hall by the Public

Art Commission. Community members of all ages gathered to create signs featuring up-lifting messages centered on unity, kindness and service. These pieces will be displayed later this spring in Leavitt Park, extending the impact of Dr. MLK, Jr. Day.

- The South Suburban Hu-mane Society also debuted a new service opportunity that quickly became a favorite. Volunteers signed up to make blankets for shelter dogs and to read to cats at the shelter, an activity designed to help socialize the animals and prepare them for adoption by familiarizing them with hu-man voices and interaction.

As has become something of a Flossmoor tradition, the day ar-rived with below-freezing tem-peratures. Despite the cold, par-ticipation remained strong, with many projects seeing record num-bers of volunteers. When weather required flexibility, the groups

pivoted quickly and creatively. At Sand Ridge Nature Center, volun-teers moved indoors and worked on paper-mâché enrichment proj-ects, designed specifically for wild turkeys, providing stimulation and care for the animals during the winter months.

Thank you to all who partic-ipated and all who organized a project! Special thank you to Flossmoor School District 161 for opening all of its schools that day for a service project, creating accessible and welcoming spac-es for volunteers throughout the community.

Resident Reminders

PET LICENSE RENEWAL

All Flossmoor dogs and cats must be licensed annually by April 15 each year. Renewal information will be sent in March to previously registered pets. New licenses may be obtained at Village Hall (2800 Flossmoor Road). Fees are \$15/dog or cat. There is a maximum of three dogs and/or cats permitted in each home.

VEHICLE USE FEE TO REPLACE STICKER

In February, the Board of Trustees agreed to eliminate the annual vehicle sticker requirement in Flossmoor, due to compliance, enforcement, and customer satisfaction issues. As the revenue generated by the stickers is needed for street maintenance and infrastructure repair, the Board has decided to assess a Vehicle Use Fee per household in its place. Details on the fee will be coming soon; the anticipated monthly fee is expected to take effect in May. In the meantime, there will be no need to purchase a 2026 sticker for your vehicle this spring.

SPRING FLOODING

Just one inch of water can cause more than \$25,000 in damage to a home and with unpredictable spring weather, homes inside and outside of high-risk flood zones are at risk. Most homeowners and renters insurance policies do not cover flood damage, and flood insurance policies don't automatically renew. Call your insurance agent to learn about flood insurance, or learn more at FloodSmart.gov.

CHANGES TO SECURITY ALARM FEES

In February, the Board of Trustees amended Chapters 100 and 150 of the Flossmoor Municipal Code regarding security alarm systems. The Code now requires a \$35 residential alarm application fee and a \$50 commercial alarm application fee. In addition, there is now also a \$35 annual renewal fee for residential alarms and a \$50 annual renewal fee for commercial alarms. Annual renewals will be due by April 15 each year. In addition, the amended ordinance has also changed the fee structure for false alarms. Alarm holders are permitted up to two false alarms annually. Starting with the third false alarm, there is a graduated fee scale. These changes will be effective May 1, 2026. If your home residence or commercial business has a professional alarm system, please return the form that was mailed to you in March, or stop into the Police Department to complete a new form. This new fee structure will help cover important services provided by the Fire and Police Departments throughout the year.
